- It's our Camp Conquerors counselors praying with a child who has been suffering from depression while roasting marshmallows or a leader baptizing a camper after they decide to follow Christ for the first time.

As we launch into 2025, our commitment to being the salt of the earth and light of the world has only intensified. We look forward to all God has in store for us this year and beyond!

As we close another memorable year at the <u>AO1 Foundation</u>, we are incredibly grateful and have a continued posture of service. We have reached new heights as an organization thanks to the unwavering support of over 300 volunteers and the families and businesses supporting our work financially.



In the <u>Outdoor Ministry</u>, our staff felt led to serve children either in the foster care system or those recently adopted. In response, we hosted an additional week of <u>Camp Conquerors</u> to surround these children with Godly counselors and others facing the same challenges. In total, our staff and volunteers hosted 141 children through three weeks of Camp Conquerors. Thanks to your generosity, every child in 2024 was aligned with a sponsor and attended camp free of charge.

Through <u>Mountain Movers</u>, we continued to push into wild and remote places to encourage children to disconnect from their devices and connect with God through the outdoors. We traveled thousands of miles, processed hundreds of pounds of wild game and impacted countless lives for eternity.

At the start of 2024, Thy Kingdom Crumb set a goal of 65 food truck outreaches to serve over 12,000 people throughout the Indianapolis area. However, we quickly recognized just how great of a need existed and that we were capable of more. With a grateful heart, I'm proud to share that our team hosted 79 outreaches and served over 14,000 free meals to shatter our goals for the year. Our guests were hungry for the delicately crafted meals we provided but also for the truth and hope of God's word.



The AO1 Foundation enters 2025 with a passion for wholeheartedly serving others through our ministries. We want to model what Jesus said in Matthew 25, "Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me."

# EVENT RECAP



Giving Hearts Day, a 24-hour fundraising event, has become an annual tradition. We participated for the fifth time in 2024 and raised more than \$30,000. Overall, this event has provided more than \$330,000 for the Outdoor Ministry.



For the first time, we hosted an AO1 Experience in Carson's hometown of Bismarck, N.D. The event was a success as more than 200 people joined us. It was a memorable night of reconnecting with old friends and forming new partnerships.



We returned to the Lucas Estate for the second AO1 Experience: Indianapolis in March. Guests enjoyed delicious appetizers from Thy Kingdom Crumb, a film session with Carson and some incredible auction and raffle items.



The AO1 Experience in Fargo is where the foundation began, and we've hosted this event seven times. In 2024, we changed venues, which created a great atmosphere to connect with many who have been with us since the beginning.



# TKC RALLIES BEHIND HVAF AFTER FIRE DEVASTATES FACILITY

For Andrea Carlile, the evening of October 26, 2024, wasn't dissimilar to a typical Saturday night for her and her husband as they scrolled through the channels on television. At the same time, Caleb Wuethrich, Director of Thy Kingdom Crumb, was at his home across town and decided to tune in to the local news. What they saw next is something neither will ever forget. Both watched as the Manchester Apartments of Helping Veterans and Families of Indiana (HVAF) was consumed by fire. When the smoke cleared, everyone was safe, but 48 veterans were once again without a home.



In the days following, Wuethrich traveled to HVAF to offer the support of Thy Kingdom Crumb. He arrived in a chaotic environment as the organization scrambled to find temporary housing for these veterans. "Coming in with a calm spirit was powerful," said Wuethrich, "We just gathered in a circle right in front of the building and made a request known to God to just steady everyone there, for the Holy Spirit to uplift everyone and to just provide wisdom through this time of uncertainty."

Today, 10% of the homeless population in Indianapolis are veterans. HVAF has served Indiana for more than 30 years by providing life-changing services beyond housing, including employment services, case management, essential food, clothing and hygiene items. As Community Engagement Coordinator, Carlile has enjoyed building a relationship with Thy Kingdom Crumb through food truck outreaches in the parking lot. "One thing I love about TKC is everyone on staff is so genuine and not just with food." She added, "It's the heart of the people that work there that makes it so special."



Together, the two decided that Thy Kingdom Crumb could increase its frequency of visiting the facility and that the veterans could be transported by bus back to enjoy a hot meal at the food truck. The first outreach after the fire came on November 15 and guests were treated to a brisket chili with jalapeno cornbread or a grilled cheese caprese with tomato bisque.

Carlile shared, "It was hot, absolutely delicious, and that's enough to brighten someone's day or even their week." Wuethrich also recalls that day was a particularly memorable outreach for the staff and volunteers. "There was a lot of thankfulness, a lot of joy and some really good conversation."

Thy Kingdom Crumb returned to HVAF for two more outreaches before the end of the year and remains committed to serving veterans as the rebuilding process begins.



The <u>Outdoor Ministry</u> provides unforgettable outdoor experiences for children who have endured life-altering circumstances through two programs: Mountain Movers and Camp Conquerors.

Mountain Movers creates once-in-a-lifetime hunting, fishing and hiking adventures for children with life-altering medical conditions.

Camp Conquerors is a free overnight summer camp for children with life-altering medical conditions or who are in the foster care system.

What comes to mind when you think about the scrapbook moments from junior high to college? A sporting event? Prom? Graduation?

The Bittner family from Dickinson, N.D., has experienced plenty of those exciting moments with their sons, Grant and Owen. However, they have also experienced a loss that few can fathom when their daughter, Grace (9), passed away after a life-long battle with cancer.

The AO1 Foundation has had a front-row seat through every high and every low in Owen's life since his first time at Camp Conquerors in 2018. Cole Scherbenske, now the director of the Outdoor Ministry, recalls having Owen in his cabin when he served as a counselor at that first camp. "I remember him being pretty quiet, he kept to himself for the most part, but throughout camp, I saw him open up and look for relationships with people."



Owen followed the path the AO1 Foundation had in mind when it created the Outdoor Ministry. He went on a Mountain Movers adventure to Montana with his brother the following year. He has attended camp six times and now serves as a counselor for the junior high camp. "It was the relationships that kept bringing me back," said Bittner. "These people told me about Jesus and showed me what living for Him was like."



Bittner enjoys guiding others in their faith, and through his spiritual development in the Outdoor Ministry, the Lord has revealed his passion and heart for ministry. Now a freshman at North Dakota State University, where his brother is also enrolled, Owen is pursuing that conviction and desires to become a pastor one day. As an active member of Chi Alpha, a college ministry, he participates in a small group, started a "preach lab" to practice writing and delivering sermons and is constantly sharing his faith with those he encounters on campus. "I've just seen him go from a quiet little boy to a man who is adamant about sharing his passion and his love for Jesus Christ," Scherbenske shared.

Owen plans to return to camp this summer to continue discipling the campers he's built a relationship with as a counselor. "When you are a part of this ministry, you are so loved that you want to go back," said Bittner. "You get to hear about the hope we have in Jesus, and the best part is you get to see it and experience it."

AO1 ADDS THIRD CAMP TO SERVE CHILDREN IN FOSTER CARE

Since 2018, more than 500 children have attended Camp Conquerors in North Dakota. There have been countless snacks served, rope swings into the pond, chapel messages shared and most importantly, lives transformed each week.

For the last several years, camp director, Lexie Scherbenske, has felt a calling to expand camp to begin serving the foster care community and children who have recently been adopted. "We've seen how impactful camp has been for our kids who have medical conditions, and so we wanted to offer that for foster youth," she shared. "We know what they've been through, and they deserve the same experiences that any other kid gets in the summertime."



Through their existing partnership with North Dakota 4-H, the AO1 Foundation decided to add a third week of camp in 2024 to serve those children, but the process of getting ready for camp was unlike any prep they had done before. Scherbenske and their team spent months meeting with state employees, social workers and camp directors in other states so they were fully prepared for check-in on July 24.

Marcia Beachum from Moorhead, MN, has adopted three boys from foster care and thought her son, Michael, would be a great fit. "I think this camp validates their situation. When they are surrounded by their peers, they can build that camaraderie and realize they aren't alone in the struggles they face." Marcia shared that one of the reasons she felt comfortable sending Michael to camp was the staff-to-camper ratio of nearly 1:1.

This year, 21 children attended the inaugural foster care camp in Washburn, N.D., where they enjoyed activities like archery tag, basketball, kayaking, woodburning picture frames and more. For Scherbenske the highlight was seeing the relationships form throughout the week. "You could tell they were all pretty nervous which is typical for kids coming to camp," but she added, "I know that they left knowing there are people who love them dearly and are there to encourage and support them."



To only reinforce that idea, chapel messages focused on the love of Jesus for each camper. After recapping the week with her son, Marcia sees it as, "an investment into their heart, mind and soul that stays with them." She added, "That kind of thing can quiet the distractions in the world and their mind and honestly can change the entire trajectory of their life."






The AO1 Foundation's fiscal year runs from January 1 to December 31, with an independent audit performed annually.




